

**30-DAY FUND REPORT EMERGENCY GRANTS TO STUDENTS UNDER
THE CARES ACT (HEERF I), CRRSAA HEERF II), ARP(HEERF III)**

Simmons University has signed and returned, to the Department of Education, the Certification and Agreement related to all three Higher Education Emergency Relief Funds . The University intends to use no less than the required amount of funds received to provide HEERF grants to students .

As of June 30th, the University has received \$4,932,392 from the Department pursuant to the our Certification and Agreement for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students. As of June 30, 2021 Simmons University distributed \$2,234,742 to students in Higher Education Emergency Funds

Currently Simmons University has an estimated 6,116 students who are eligible to receive Higher Education Emergency Grant Funds and as of March 13, 2020 3,873 students have received Higher Education Emergency Grant Funding

Methodology for determining which students initially received Emergency Financial Aid Grants and how much they will receive under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act.

Knowing that our on ground population of students were directly affected by the disruption to campus activities due to the Coronavirus, we worked to spread funds equitably across our on ground population. Based on the Department of Education's explanation of the methodology for calculating the funds we received "The first factor(75%) primarily allocates funds based on undergraduate enrollment since Pell Grant eligibility is limited to undergraduates and students in post baccalaureate teacher education programs. The second factor(25%) allocates funds based on undergraduate and graduate enrollment." So of the \$1,111,221, we allocated 75% to undergraduate students and 25% to graduate students. Further, as was suggested by the Department of Education, we prioritized students by need level as shown on the chart to the right.

On August 7, 2020 the office of Student Financial Services sent an email to all undergraduate students ahead of the 2020 Fall semester. The University had made the decision to be remote for the Fall term and we knew that there were some students who, because of changes to the campus operations, would need financial help for technology purchases in order to be successful in the term ahead. With the small amount of funds we had remaining from the CARES Act we created a CARES Act Technology application.

*At institutions that provide both online and ground-based education, those students who were enrolled exclusively in an online program on March 13, 2020, the date of the President's Proclamation, "Declaring a National Emergency Concerning the Novel Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19) Outbreak," Federal Register Vol. 85, No. 53 at 15337- 38, are not eligible for emergency financial aid grants. The formula provided by Congress for calculating the distribution of funds to institutions excludes students who were exclusively enrolled in distance education courses. Additionally, the emergency financial aid grants to students are for expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to coronavirus, and students who were enrolled exclusively in online programs would not have expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to coronavirus.

Methodology for determining which students received Emergency Financial Aid Grants and how much they will receive under CRRSAA

The second round of Higher Education Emergency Grants, under CRRSAA, allowed us to award to online students as well as students that did not file a FAFSA. There was specific guidance requiring Institutions to prioritize students with exceptional need. Using the Pell EFC as an indication of exceptional need, we provided block grants of \$350 to all enrolled students who had a Pell eligible EFC. We used this same formula for Graduate students as they are not eligible for Pell Grants but this remains a marker of exceptional need. The remaining funds were allocated through the use of an application that was sent through communication to all students.

Methodology for determining which students receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants and how much they will receive under ARP

We expect to use a similar methodology to the CRRSAA as the ARP also requires the University to prioritize students with exceptional need. We expect to also use an application for any remaining funds that will be open to all students with emergency needs.

Instructions, Directions and Guidance provided by Simmons University regarding CARES Act (HEERF I)

On May 19, 2020 all eligible students received an email informing them of their eligibility for a grant from the CARES Act. Attached to that email was a letter describing the details and also informing them of the ability to request additional funds.

The email regarding the CARES Act Emergency funding is included below:

As this unprecedented Spring semester comes to an end, we hope that you and your family are staying safe and healthy. As a University, our main goal has been the safety and wellbeing of our students, faculty and staff. We understand that this has also been an academic adjustment and want to acknowledge that and commend you on the strength and commitment you have shown to your studies.

The coronavirus has caused us to adjust to a new way of life and the disruption to campus operations has left students with unanticipated costs for things like living expenses, technology, course materials and printing costs. Last week we received money from the federal government as part of the CARES Act. We are committed to providing this emergency assistance to you and are reaching out to let you know that we will be pushing a grant refund, through your student account, to you in the coming week.

This grant will not be a credit on your account and if you owe money, it will not go against those charges. We are merely using the student account as a way of getting these funds into your hands as quickly as possible. To that end, if you are not currently set up with direct deposit, through your student account in touch net, please do that as soon as possible otherwise we will be required to send a paper check to you.

Understanding that each student's need is different we have reserved a small portion of these funds. If your expenses related to the disruption to campus operations is greater than the grant you will receive, you may submit an [application](#) on our website to request further assistance.

CARES Act funding for Returning Students for Technology

Funding from the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, which was signed into federal law last March, provides support to universities for a variety of expenses, including technology costs associated with virtual learning. CARES Act funding is enabling us to support some returning undergraduate and campus-based graduate students with technology and equipment needs this semester.

In 2019-2020 Simmons provided CARES grants to all eligible students. We have reserved a limited amount of funds in order to help support eligible returning students who require technology in order to effectively attend and participate in virtual classes.

Supporting Our Students (SOS) Fund

Last spring, Simmons created the SOS Fund to help support undergraduate and graduate students cover a variety of expenses. To date we've allocated more than \$200,000 for expenses related to housing and food insecurity, immediate transportation, mental health and medical needs, among other things.

The ongoing disruption caused by the COVID-19 global pandemic continues to create enormous challenges for students and families. In response to this ongoing crisis, the federal government implement the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021 (CRRSAA), which provides additional funding for the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF).
